How to...

Get the Eco-Schools Green Flag Award

Before you begin.....

- Register your school with Eco-Schools Scotland.
- Once you have done this, you can begin work on the Seven Elements of the programme.

1. Form a Committee.

- This should include nominated pupil representatives and teachers from across the school.
- Try to include parents, non-teaching staff, members of the community, local councillors ...anyone who can help. Make sure all classes or year groups have pupil representation.



2. Complete the Environmental Review.

- The Review should be done on an annual basis, and you should use the <u>Review templates</u> available on our website. There are two versions: one for Early Years/ASN pupils, and one for Primary/Secondary pupils.
- The Review should be done for all Ten Topics. This will help you to decide which **three** of the Ten Topics to focus your actions on. Remember that the **Litter** Topic is compulsory.
- Try to include as many people as possible in this process perhaps with each class or year group taking a particular section.

4. Create an Action Plan.

- You must use the template provided on the Eco-Schools Scotland website when you apply for your Award, but feel free to design a more pupil-friendly version for your Eco Notice Board.
- Make sure that the targets you set are realistic and achievable. Prioritise them by dividing them into what is achievable in the short, medium and longer terms.
- Pupils should be in charge of updating and maintaining the Plan.
- Remember that this is a working document and that it should be reviewed at each Eco Committee meeting. Make sure it's on display in a central location.

4. Monitoring & Evaluation

- You should have at least one piece of evidence for each Topic studied.
- Charts, graphs, photographs, written evaluations, surveys these are all ways in which you can see how well your actions are going.
- Remember to do this on an on-going basis and to share your findings with the whole school community.

5. Linking to the Curriculum

- Make sure your Eco-Schools work is linked to the everyday learning in the school.
- The <u>Curriculum Outcome Maps</u> on our website provide examples of how this can be done.
- Secondary schools, and schools with a secondary department, must complete a <u>Curricular Audit</u>, with each department highlighting the Sustainable Development Education themes being delivered through their subject areas. This is a great way to identify and celebrate the 'eco' learning that is already being delivered in your school.

6. Involving the Whole School and Wider Community

- Eco-Schools is all about whole-school action. The Eco Committee should involve as many members of the school community and the community beyond the school gates as possible in Eco-Schools work, and celebrate their achievements to as wide an audience as they can.
- Newsletters, websites, GLOW, assemblies, and peer feedback to classes are just some of the ways in which this can be done.
- Schools applying for Green Flag Award status must organise a whole-school 'Day of Action'.

7. Eco Code

- Your Eco Code is your 'mission statement', and should reflect the key actions that you are taking.
- Try to involve as many members of the school community as possible in creating it, perhaps through a whole-school competition.
- It can be a song, rap, poem, statement, acrostic, logo all formats are welcome. The key is to make it memorable, and make sure that it is on display throughout the school.
