



Perth and Kinross DEVELOPMENT PLAN SCHEME



The Development Plan Scheme is a statement setting out Perth & Kinross Council's timetable for the preparation of the next development plan. Under statutory guidance, all planning authorities are required to publish annually a Development Plan Scheme. The Development Plan Scheme will set out to include:

- an explanation of what the Local Development Plan is;
- a timetable for the preparation of the next plan, Local Development Plan 3;
- community engagement in the planning process and how relevant stakeholders, including residents of Perth and Kinross, can get involved.





The Scottish Government requires every planning authority to prepare development plans for their area. The Development Plan is at the heart of the planning system setting out policies and proposals to guide the development, management and use of land. The Plan sets out a vision and a framework for future development; addressing needs and opportunities in relation to housing, economy, infrastructure, community facilities, safeguarding and enhancing environmental and landscape assets, the emerging needs of climate change and achieving well designed places for the residents, communities and businesses of Perth and Kinross. To support the preparation of the next Local Development Plan, there are a range of other plans and strategies that interlink with the LDP.





National Planning Framework 4 (NPF4)

National Planning Framework 4 was adopted in February 2023 and forms part of the Development Plan. It covers the period from its adoption to 2045 with 10 year reviews. It is a long term strategy that plans for development and investment in infrastructure; and identifies national developments and other strategically important opportunities in Scotland. The NPF contains both spatial and thematic planning policies and sets out the national policy position for land use planning. It will be used to determine planning applications.

The New Plan: LDP3

Alongside National Planning Framework 4, the Local Development Plan (LDP3) will be the main document which will influence future built development in Perth and Kinross. As NPF4 contains planning policy, new LDPs will be place-based documents with emphasis on maps, site briefs and masterplans, with minimal policy wording. The policies and proposals within the LDP are to be focused on places and locations, while National Planning Framework 4 will provide overarching thematic policies for decision making.

LDP3 Process

The Planning (Scotland) Act 2019 has introduced a number of changes to the key steps for preparing a Local Development Plan. Preparation of a new-style LDP will include:

- Evidence gathering and early community and stakeholder engagement leading to an Evidence Report.
- Submission of the Evidence Report to Scottish Ministers for an independent Gate Check.
- Collaborative plan preparation, leading to publication of the Proposed Plan for consultation.
- Submission of the Proposed Plan to Scottish Ministers for an independent examination of outstanding issues.
- Adoption of the Local Development Plan

Supporting assessments

There are several assessments that must be undertaken to support the preparation of a new Local Development Plan. They are an integral part of the plan-making process and should inform, and be informed by, the plan as it is being prepared. These include:

- Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA)
- Public Sector Equality Duty Assessment
- Fairer Scotland Duty Assessment
- Habitats Regulations Appraisal



LDP3 Timeline

The LDP3 Timeline on the next page shows the timescales for each stage of the plan making process. Key to note is the extended timescale for preparation of the Proposed Plan. The previous Development Plan Scheme (October 2024) anticipated that the Proposed Plan would be published during Q4 2025/6 (January – March 2026), however it is now programmed for Q4 2026/7 (January – March 2027).

There is a significant amount of work to be undertaken to prepare the Proposed Plan. Many of the tasks ahead will require collaboration both internally, and with key agencies, communities, infrastructure providers, the development industry, and landowners. This pathway for collaboration has already been established through the earlier engagement for the Evidence Report.

Preparation of the Evidence Report, followed by a stage that allocates more time to engage and work collaboratively to prepare the Proposed Plan, should produce a plan that meets with greater consensus at the Examination stage.

This has led us to revise the timetable to allocate more time to preparing the Proposed Plan and less time for the period from Examination to Adoption.


This means that the intended adoption date for the new Local Development Plan, whilst not exact, remains unchanged and likely to be late 2027.

All planning authorities have five years from the regulations coming into force to replace their current Local Development Plan with a new style Local Development Plan. This means the Council must prepare and adopt LDP3 by no later than May 2028.

Development Plan Schemes must specify the numbered Quarter (Q) and the year in which the planning authority expects to publish certain elements of the Local Development Plan process. This applies to the following stages:

Publish Evidence Report Q4 2024/5 (Jan - Mar 2025)
Publish Proposed Plan Q4 2026/7 (Jan - Mar 2027)
Send Proposed Plan to Scottish Ministers
Adopt LDP3 Q1 2027/8 (Apr - Jun 2027)
Q3 2027/8 (Oct - Dec 2027)

A detailed timeline outlining the Local Development Plan's key stages and the types of engagement to take place is provided in the Participation Statement.



Note: Quarters in timeline follow financial rather than calendar year - Q1 (April to June); Q2 (July to September); Q3 (October to December), and Q4 (January to March).

^{*} We plan to provide various opportunities to engage with the Proposed LDP3 preparation across this timeframe, including through a 'Call for Sites', more focused place-based discussions (where appropriate), engagement with our key stakeholders on main issues, and an opportunity to make representations on the Proposed Plan before its submission to the Examination process.



Mediation

The Council will work with all stakeholders to discuss any issues which could lead to potential challenges/concerns throughout the plan preparation process. One method that can be used to support this is mediation, which can help aid discussions.

The preparation of the Evidence Report may provide the opportunity for concerns or disputes in the evidence base to be discussed, to explore whether a potential dispute may be resolved at this stage.

Mediation may be used in the latter stages of the plan preparation when the Proposed Plan is published and subject to further representations.

The Council will be open to considering any requests from stakeholders to use mediation, taking into account the potential benefits in terms of saving time and cost, and fostering better relationships going forward. This could be on an informal basis or through an independent third party

Local Place Plans

Local Place Plans offer communities the opportunity to produce a plan for their area expressing their aspirations and ambitions for future change. They focus on the community's proposals for the development and use of land and provide a new opportunity for communities to feed into the planning system with ideas and proposals.

While the steps to prepare a Local Place Plan are set out in regulations and guidance, there is scope for different approaches to be taken. Once registered, Local Place Plans are taken into account when the Proposed Plan is being prepared. They are valuable because they help us to better understand local issues and how to meet the community's needs.

Local Place Plans may be prepared at any time; however those that are registered in 2025 will have most opportunity to be taken into account when preparing the Proposed Plan.

Information and guidance have been published for community groups who are interested in producing their own Local Place Plan and communities can seek assistance from the Council and its partners. This process of support is designed to be flexible to respond to issues as they arise. Further information on Local Place Plans can be found here:

Participation Statement

Relevant

The Planning (Scotland) Act 2019 places an increased emphasis on up-front engagement. This means that consultation needs to be comprehensive, co-ordinated and collaborative.

The Participation Statement sets out our approach to consultation and engagement associated with the review of the Perth & Kinross Local Development Plan 3 (LDP3). Our consultation commitment is set out below.

Discussions will be relevant to each group or stakeholder, including both settlement

Consultation Commitment Statement

The LDP3 engagement and evidence building process will be:

Relevant	development and policies and the methods that are used to carry out those discussions.
Inclusive	To shape places that work for all we will proactively seek the views of all people, especially those with specific needs and those whose views are seldom heard; identify and overcome barriers to engagement and invest in the promotion of the benefits of engaging.
Informed	Discussions will be informed by evidence already available including data gathering and prior consultations to ensure contributions have a greater impact and are more efficient
Co-ordinated	A joined up approach with the rest of Council and Council strategies, will deliver greater efficiency, and help avoid consultation fatigue. Information fed back to other departments will also help deliver their priorities
Collaborative	Co-designing consultation and supporting community partners to carry out their own engagement work will ensure the greatest reach and response working
Transparent	Ongoing communication and feedback between the team and stakeholders, communities and partners will support better outcomes and promote acceptance of outcomes.
Accessible	Engagement events and materials for the general public must be accessible to all wherever possible, and tailored arrangements made where this is not possible.




